Sometimes when we are in the midst of work it seems like we are not achieving as much as we would like to achieve. However when I look at all the work we have done these past 12 months it's been an

awesome ride thanks to the team at ARMS. We opened our fourth Safari playgroup this year and WISE hub opened in two more locations in Auckland, Panmure and Northcote, working in partnership with De Paul House. We have also run four short community engagement/ consultations on behalf of Auckland Council and Central Government. Our International Women's Day event saw over 220 diverse women from across Auckland gather to hear from inspiring diverse women, we trialled some new community participation initiatives and we have worked hard at reaching more people through WISE catering with a 20% increase in orders.

So all in all we have had a full year and are excited about this coming year. I would like to extent a heartfelt thanks to ARMS staff and volunteer team and in particular to those staff who left us this year to take up new challenges of motherhood and career growth; without your work we would not have achieved all that we have.

WISE PROJECT

My name is Nasra. I'm originally from Somalia but was born and raised in the United Emirates. I chose to apply as an asylum seeker when I fell pregnant with my second child. My first child was unable to access any support services and I didn't want my second child to face the same struggles so I applied to come to New Zealand; a safe place where you have a right to live.

After being accepted I made the hard decision to temporarily leave my 2 year old son so there would be a future for my both my children. I arrived in NZ and not long after had my second child. Whilst others reached out to support me initially, I was very much alone. With health complications since my second birth, refugee friends leaving to other countries, a 4 year delay with my first child's immigration, and the pressures of looking after a new-born, I was very depressed.

I was really isolated and unhappy but that all changed when I joined WISE. I was visiting my lawyer when I decided to check it out and have loved it ever since. I feel like I am alive now.

Thanks to WISE I was given an employment opportunity as an interpreter. Currently I'm working on becoming a licensed interpreter and starting up an aerobics class for women like me in my community whose health has taken a toll from similar situations.

Being a part of WISE I've gained so much. My mind is clearer as I'm able to hear and share with others my struggles, learn new things, gain new friends and support, gain opportunities and more importantly slowly make my way back to my old self. I'm happy and confident and stepping outside my comfort shell to continue learning and give the support I didn't receive to others in the community.

Although I had many struggles getting to and starting life in NZ, thanks to WISE I can now not only see a bright future for my children but also for myself.

OUR IMPACT

SAFARI PROJECT

Amani is a Syrian mother of two who regularly attended the Safari Project with her youngest son. Arabic is her first language and she didn't speak any English. At Safari whilst her children played and socialised, she would take part in the English classes offered free as well as the other information sessions available.

At first she would only talk Arabic sticking to staff that could speak Arabic, but throughout the term, she began to sit and try to communicate with the other mothers at Safari in English. She was getting more confident as her English language skills improved which meant she became more social, even telling the staff member who could speak Arabic to only communicate to her in English so she could practice the language even further. Both Amani and her child were developing skills, knowledge and social connections at Safari.

Amani is now considering going to tertiary study to improve her language skills and is more active in her community. Something important to Amani is that she is now able to participate and able to communicate with key organisations in the lives of her family. For example, she is now confident to go to her older sons school parent teacher interviews and ask questions about her sons education and learning in class; something she wasn't able to take part in before.

On Friday 8th March at the War Memorial Hall, over 200 women from different ethnicities and all walks of life, gathered to celebrate International Women's Day with the theme this year being 'Press for Progress'.

The International Women's Day celebration was a great success due to community coming together. Led by ARMS and funded by Office of Ethnic Communities, different organisations partnered together and a range of women leaders as guest speakers from the community each played an important part in making the event a success.

Over 15 different ethnicities were represented at the event, showing a true representation of Auckland and its diversity. It was very empowering to see women, children and some men of various age and ethnic background supporting this event and the issues above - each signing their support which was delivered to the Ministry of Women; requesting them to #PressforProgress

The day provided the opportuinty to reflect on the importance of gender equality, celebrate the successes of women, and to acknowledge the work that is still left to be done.

Internationally on the 18th December 2017 we celebrated International Migrant Day where we recognised the value and beauty of our diversity and celebrated it.

New Zealand is one of the super diverse countries in the world thanks to migrants so International Migrant Day is an important day to celebrate.

In recognition of the day Auckland Regional Migrant Services (ARMS) hosted a morning tea with the new migrant communities in Auckland that gave migrants an opportunity to connect with others and share their stories.

Migrants have contributed to the rapid growth and development of Auckland, adding value and diversity across industries and sectors. It's evident in sports and social clubs, in schools, and among our workforce. In addition skilled migrants make up 60 per cent of total immigrants. With these new arrivals come new business, new investment and new connections with key export markets.

Despite this, Auckland needs to strengthen engagement with ethnic communities, within their neighbourhoods and local communities. We need to embrace this diversity and work towards better integration platforms, through sharing ethnic food, participating in ethnic festivals such as Lantern festival or Diwali and by also recruiting more diverse workforce, and treating everyone with equal respect.

The day helps us celebrate our diversity whilst also bringing to light the issues migrants face.




