Shaping our Futures Together Hui was co-hosted by Belong Aotearoa and Te Wānanga o Aotearoa (TWOA) to:


- Inspire relationships and partnerships based on respect, shared experiences and intertwined futures.



rated the overall hui as very positive (55%) or positive (38%) of 47 respondents


said coming together was very valuable (52%) or valuable (27%) of 44 respondents


